Start the day with a cookery class at Cook in Milano, 15 minutes away from the hotel by taxi.

Where better to learn to cook perfect pizza or pasta than in the country famed for their creation? An ideal activity for teenagers and keen instagrammers to do solo, or something for the whole family to enjoy together, there are plenty of classes to enjoy at the Cook in Milano cooking school. Then, take a taxi for the 15-minute journey to San Siro Stadium.



SAN SIRO STADIUM TOUR

Milan is a city that lives for football and whilst its two home teams – F.C. Inter and A.C. Milan – may share a stadium, their rivalry is one of the fiercest in Europe. Lovers of football won't want to miss a visit to the stadium, San Siro, to explore the on-site museum and take a tour of the facility, which includes access to dressing rooms and the Tunnel of Champions.

From the stadium, the da Vinci Museum is a 15-minute taxi ride away.



MUSEO NAZIONALE DELLA SCIENZA E DELLA TECNOLOGIA "LEONARDO DA VINCI"

Formerly a monastery and now Italy's largest science and technology museum, the da Vinci Museum houses a 16,000-piece strong collection of objects and artefacts ranging from the artistic to the scientific, including an entire department dedicated to science for young people. The museum's collection of da Vinci's models is a particular highlight.

Next, make your way to Luini Milano, 20 minutes away by taxi or a 25-minute walk.

For an authentic taste of Italy, stop by Luini Milano for a panzerotti. Found mere steps from the Duomo, this eatery is a local favourite that has largely remained off the tourist map. While the panzerotti they serve here is simple – freshly fried and folded dough parcels encasing mozzarella and tomato sauce, or a choice of seasonal fillings – it's incredibly popular, so be prepared for a queue.

Then, take a 20-minute taxi ride or 25-minute walk to Corso Como.



GARIBALDI AND CORSO COMO

Once the gateway to old Milan, Corso Como - a pedestrianized street in the Garibaldi district - has, in recent years, gained a reputation as the go-to neighbourhood for nightlife and café culture. Teeming with bars, restaurants and nightclubs, this is where old and new Milan collide and the youthful, stylish crowd brings a renewed energy to the old cobbled streets.

The hotel is then a 10-minute walk from Corso Como or a five-minute drive.
